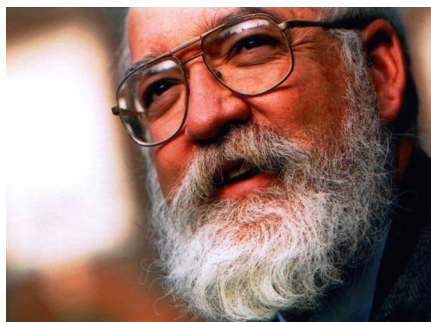

Daniel Dennett

One of the world's most important living philosophers, **Dan Dennett**, is best known for his provocative and controversial arguments.

He is credited with uncovering important aspects of the nature of consciousness whose origins lie deep in the Paleozoic formation of early life on earth. In common human thinking and behavior lie the roots of much deeper questions about the nature and quality of our civilization..

If we are to have a future, the essence of that future will lie within the understanding of our present and its genesis in the past. Daniel Dennett offers us an opportunity to grasp the tools of our survival, not in scientific terms alone, but in the broader context of the ways of life afforded by a life of knowledge.

Other guest speakers:

Dr. Ryan Cragun PhD, of the University of Tampa, will provide an often humorous overview of the logical fallacies and factual errors of anti-Darwinian arguments.

Michael Hoffman, MD, a neurological scientist and surgeon from Sarasota, will discuss the physical evolution of the human brain and recent discoveries in brain science, with implications for the future of our species.

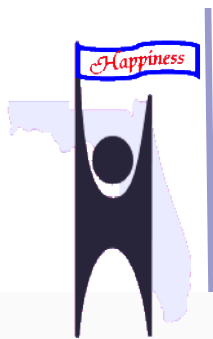

What is Humanism?

A video presentation by Frank Ferudi, followed by a group discussion of these ideas and how it applies to our own experience.

Professor Frank Ferudi

Professor of Sociology Frank Furedi answers the question 'What is Humanism?' in this short lecture filmed in the WORLDbytes studio. Whilst humanist ideas have been around for a long time, he observes, they have never been more weakly affirmed than at present. In ancient as well as renaissance times thinkers struggled with questions around what forces determine our destiny and began to formulate ideas that human beings themselves, rather than God or nature had a responsibility for making the world. Humanism, we learn, begins to flourish in renaissance Italy and finds more mature expression in the 17th and 18th centuries. Modern determinisms such as 19th century economic determinism or today's eco-determinism, biological determinism or psychological determinism are all really evasions or excuses that diminish our own sense of taking responsibility for what happens. A Humanist outlook should equip us with an orientation towards reason, problem-solving and a healthy skepticism towards determinisms (or the fates) in the present day. Professor Furedi doesn't overcomplicate the issue or use mystifying jargon in this refreshing and enlightening lecture. Presented in two parts with discussion in between.

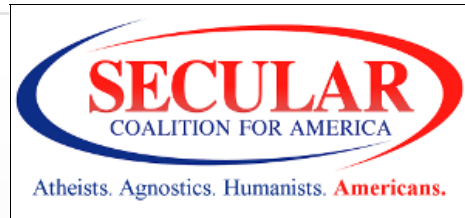

FLORIDA REPORT

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State



Dear ACLU Supporter,

Earlier this month, a federal judge ruled that the NSA's "Orwellian" mass telephone spying program likely violates the Fourth Amendment. And, in a second major blow, President Obama's own NSA review panel also called for an end to the bulk collection of our private phone data.

Here is what I know — if we fight for what is right, if we seize every opening to make progress, and if we never, ever yield to setbacks, our work in the defense of freedom will pay off in the long run.

Right now, that is exactly what is happening in our efforts to end the NSA's dragnet surveillance program. **And contributions from supporters like you mean we can keep seizing EVERY opportunity for victory without stopping to find the resources to take action.**

Challenging secret surveillance programs isn't easy — just ask any ACLU attorney who has been working on privacy and national security issues for the last decade. That is why Edward Snowden's revelations about the NSA were such a game-changer.

When they came to light, our lawyers were able to jump into action — because they'd been there before and because we had the funds to act. And we know exactly what to do now to make sure this un-American and unconstitutional program is brought to an end.

And right now, we've got to keep the pressure on by pursuing our lawsuit challenging the program and by pressing the President and Congress to act.

Secular Coalition for America



The Secular Coalition helped draft legislation that was introduced this week by Congresswoman Barbara Lee (D-CA). The bill would shift \$50 million from abstinence-only education to medically accurate sex education.

Since 1996, the U.S. has spent over \$1.75 billion in federal funding for abstinence-only programs that do not include information on how to prevent unintended pregnancy or STI's including HIV. The bill, HR 3774, would end federal funding of abstinence only until marriage programs. The Secular Coalition worked closely with Rep. Lee's office in crafting language for the legislation.

In the United States, fracking is widely regarded as the biggest energy development in decades, a revolution that is making America self-sufficient in oil and natural gas. Now the petroleum industry wants to bring fracking to Europe, and promises equally grand results.

But there is a problem: if we look beyond mere claims and promises, and examine the actual data on environmental impacts and on oil and gas production potential, the shale revolution in America is revealed to be a costly, destructive project whose benefits are short-lived. In *Snake Oil*, I offer evidence to back up that assessment. Even more has emerged since the book was first published in April of this year..

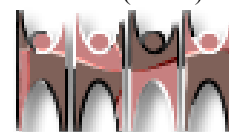
In July 2013, the *Los Angeles Times* published an investigative report by Neela Banerjee based on Environmental Protection Agency internal documents, showing that the EPA had systematically ignored evidence of environmental harms from fracking, choosing not to publicize or act on data collected by its own staff. Evidently the Obama administration finds temporarily rising oil and gas production figures so enthralling that it is willing to ignore the long-term costs to water and air quality, and to the health of humans, livestock, and wildlife.

Meanwhile former Mobil Oil VP Louis W. Allstadt, who spent his career running oil production operations and company mergers, now speaks on behalf of anti-fracking resistance groups, pointing to studies revealing that compromised casings (and resulting instances of water contamination) are far more common than the industry claims.

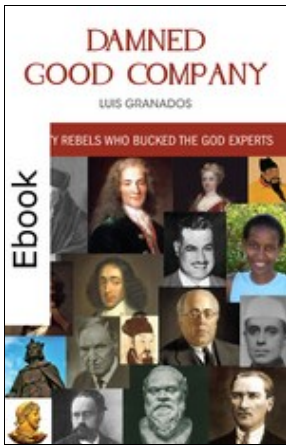
As a result of these kinds of revelations, citizen-led groups are continuing to form across the country to oppose fracking, and the oil and gas industry is increasingly on the defensive.

I hope you are doing well and that whatever holiday(s) you celebrate, they are fun and enjoyable and loving.

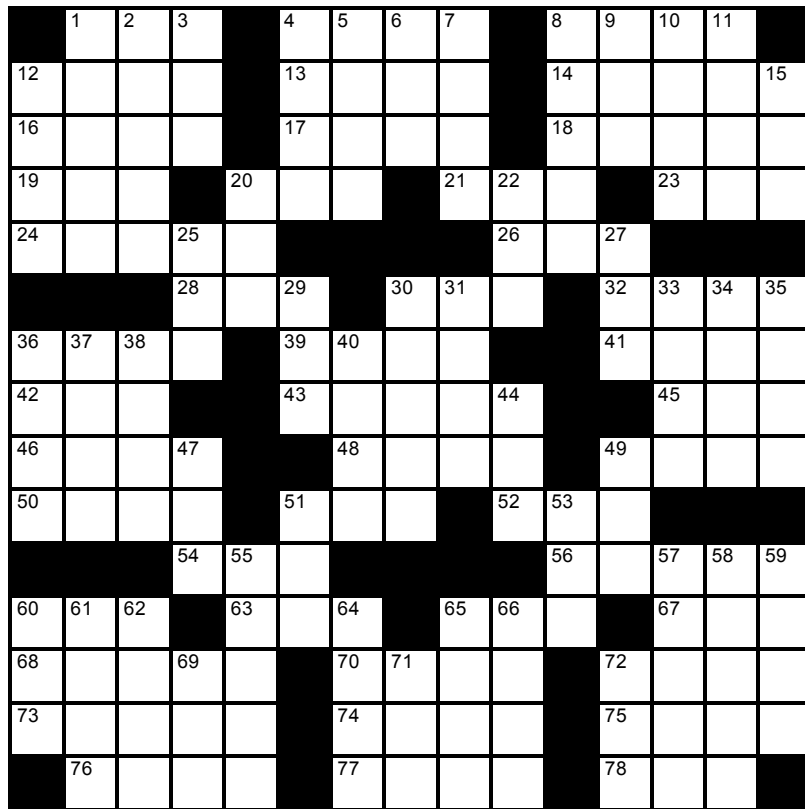

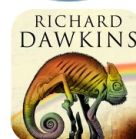

[Robert Reich](#), one of the nation's leading experts on work and the economy, is Chancellor's Professor of Public Policy at the Goldman School of Public Policy at the University of California at Berkeley. He has served in three national administrations, most recently as secretary of labor under President Bill Clinton. Time Magazine has named him one of the ten most effective cabinet secretaries of the last century. It's the season to show concern for the less fortunate among us. We should also be concerned about the widening gap between the *most* fortunate and everyone else. Although it's still possible to win the lottery (your chance of winning \$648 million in the recent Mega Millions sweepstakes was one in 259 million), the biggest lottery of all is what family we're born into. Our life chances are now determined to an unprecedented degree by the wealth of our parents.

That's not always been the case. The faith that anyone could move from rags to riches – with enough guts and gumption, hard work and nose to the grindstone – was once at the core of the American Dream. And equal opportunity was the heart of the American creed. Although imperfectly achieved, that ideal eventually propelled us to overcome legalized segregation by race, and to guarantee civil rights. It fueled efforts to improve all our schools and widen access to higher education. It pushed the nation to help the unemployed, raise the minimum wage, and provide pathways to good jobs. Much of this was financed by taxes on the most fortunate.

But for more than three decades we've been going backwards. It's far more difficult today for a child from a poor family to become a middle-class or wealthy adult. Or even for a middle-class child to become wealthy. The major reason is widening inequality. The longer the ladder, the harder the climb. America is now more unequal than it's been for eighty or more years, with the most unequal distribution of income and wealth of all developed nations. Equal opportunity has become a pipe dream.

Rather than respond with policies to reverse the trend and get us back on the road to equal opportunity and widely-shared prosperity, we've spent much of the last three decades doing the opposite. Taxes have been cut on the rich, public schools have deteriorated, higher education has become unaffordable for many, safety nets have been shredded, and the minimum wage has been allowed to drop 30 percent below where it was in 1968, adjusted for inflation. Congress has just passed a tiny bipartisan budget agreement, and the Federal Reserve has decided to wean the economy off artificially low interest rates. Both decisions reflect Washington's (and Wall Street's) assumption that the economy is almost back on track. But it's not at all back on the track it was on more than three decades ago.

It's certainly not on track for the record 4 million Americans now unemployed for more than six months, or for the unprecedented 20 million American children in poverty (we now have the highest rate of child poverty of all developed nations other than Romania), or for the third of all working Americans whose jobs are now part-time or temporary, or for the majority of Americans whose real wages continue to drop.

How can the economy be back on track when 95 percent of the economic gains since the recovery began in 2009 have gone to the richest 1 percent?

The underlying issue is a moral one: What do we owe one another as members of the same society? Conservatives answer that question by saying it's a matter of personal choice – of charitable works, philanthropy, and individual acts of kindness joined in “a thousand points of light.”

But that leaves out what we could and should seek to accomplish together as a society. It neglects the organization of our economy, and its social consequences. It minimizes the potential role of democracy in determining the rules of the game, as well as the corruption of democracy by big money. It overlooks our strivings for social justice.

In short, it ducks the meaning of a decent society.

Last month Pope Francis wondered aloud whether “trickle-down theories, which assume that economic growth, encouraged by a free market, will inevitably succeed in bringing about greater justice and inclusiveness...”. Rush Limbaugh accused the Pope of being a Marxist for merely raising the issue.

But the question of how to bring about greater justice and inclusiveness is as American as apple pie. It has animated our efforts for more than a century – during the Progressive Era, the New Deal, the Great Society, and beyond — to make capitalism work for the betterment of all rather merely than the enrichment of a few.

The supply-side, trickle-down, market-fundamentalist views that took root in America in the early 1980s got us fundamentally off track. To get back to the kind of shared prosperity and upward mobility we once considered normal will require another era of fundamental reform, of both our economy and our democracy.
