



"THIS IS MY VISION OF "LIFE"

By Richard Dawkins

Natural selection is about the differential survival of coded information which has power to influence its probability of being replicated, which pretty much means genes. Coded information, which



has the power to make copies of itself—"replicator"—whenever that comes into existence in the universe, it potentially could be the basis for some kind of Darwinian selection. And when that happens, you then have the opportunity for this extraordinary phenomenon which we call "life".

My conjecture is that if there is life elsewhere in the universe, it will be Darwinian life. I think there's only one way for this hyper complex phenomenon which we call "life" to arise from the laws of physics. The laws of physics—if you throw a stone up in the air, it describes a parabola, and that's it. But biology, without ever violating the laws of physics, does the most extraordinary things; it produces machines which can run, and walk, and fly, and dig, and swing through the trees, and think, and produce the whole of human technology, human art, human music. This all comes about because at some point in history, about 4 billion years ago, a replicating entity arose, not a gene as we would now see it, but something functionally equivalent to a gene, which because it had the power to replicate and the power to influence its own probability of replicating, and replicated with slight errors, gave rise to the whole of life.

If you ask me what my ambition would be, it would be that everybody would understand what an extraordinary, remarkable thing it is that they exist, in a world which would otherwise just be plain physics. The key to the process is self-replication. The key to the process is that ... let's call them "genes" because nowadays they pretty much all are genes. Genes have different probabilities of surviving. The ones that survive, because they have such high fidelity replication, are the ones which we see in the world, the ones which dominate gene pools in the world. So for me, the replicator, the gene, DNA, is absolutely key to the whole process of Darwinian natural selection. So when you ask the question, what about group selection, what about higher levels of selection, what about different levels of selection, everything comes down to gene selection. Gene selection is fundamentally what is really going on.

How you can end racism

What can those who identify as humanists, or even those who simply consider themselves decent people do to combat systemic racism? Make a concerted effort to humanize and identify with *all* individuals.

It's easy to assent to this principle in word, but it's quite another to be continuously mindful of it and endeavor to extend egalitarianism without constraint. None of this requires a belief in a god, of course, but it does entail dedication to values central to the humanist cause. Impartiality is actually a challenge when one considers the current, severely biased state of affairs. That said, it's a goal that is certainly achievable.

If you're carrying guilt for being privileged, quit wasting your time. Devote your mental energy towards something worthwhile, like transmitting heightened awareness within your sphere of influence (however marginal) and seeking to destabilize the inequitable power structure that allows and excuses the bias and cruelty involved with cases that seem to occur every week. Focus less on your guilt and more on being a catalyst for change.

Why do Humans Rule?

Seventy thousand years ago, our human ancestors were insignificant animals, just minding their own business in a corner of Africa with all the other animals. But now, few would disagree that humans dominate planet Earth; we've spread to every continent, and our actions determine the fate of other animals (and possibly Earth itself). How did we get from there to here? Historian *Yuval Noah Harari* suggests a surprising reason for the rise of humanity. A video Presentation with discussion to follow.

A lecturer in history at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem, in his book <u>Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind</u>, **Yuval Noah Harari** asks what made homo sapiens the most successful species on the planet. His answer: We are the only animal that can believe in things that exist purely in our imagination, such as gods, states, money, human rights, corporations and other "fictions," and we have developed a unique ability to use these stories to unify and organize groups and ensure cooperation. In his next book, he'll explore the growth of inequality in human society. He asks, are we on the cusp of the next great divergence?

Harari specializes in world history, medieval history and military history. His current research focuses on macro-historical questions: What is the relation between history and biology? What is the essential difference between Homo sapiens and other animals? Is there justice in history? Does history have a direction? Did people become happier as history unfolded? Harari also teaches a MOOC (Massive Open Online Course) titled A Brief History of Humankind.



Who is Richard Heinberg?

Barefoot and in a bright green T-shirt, Richard Heinberg kicks back in his Santa Rosa living room and outlines his views on the local, the global and the future of civilization. A charismatic public speaker and the author of a dozen books including *Afterburn*, his latest, Heinberg and his wife, Janet



Barocco, raise chickens, grow vegetables and cultivate backyard fruit and nut trees that nourish them all year long.

"I'm a cheerleader for local and all in favor of local solutions to economic problems," he says. "We need to reverse the trend toward the global civilization that creates instability and imbalance, and that wreaks havoc with communities everywhere."

Heinberg offers suggestions for local consumers: take your money out of big banks and deposit it in credit unions; buy at food co-ops; vote with pocketbooks; and push for local power apart from PG&E.

He also urges political activism. "Citizens should tell their representatives to reject the Trans-Pacific Partnership [TPP] that was negotiated in secret and that's meant to increase the volume of international trade at the expense of local businesses and local economies," he says. "One provision of the TPP says that if municipal governments promote local over imported, the importers can sue for lost profits."

Born in Missouri in 1950, Heinberg didn't tune into localism until 1992, when he settled in Sonoma County and began to track the dangers of globalization. From 1998 to 2008, he taught localism at the New College of California in Santa Rosa. In 2009, he joined the Post Carbon Institute, where he's now the senior fellow-in-residence.

Heinberg points out the limits to localism. "If your goal is to be 100 percent local, then you won't consume very much at all," he says. "The point, however, ought not to be 100 percent local. Trade from distant places will always be necessary. But we ought to return to some kind of balance."

In *Afterburn*, Heinberg offers gloomy thoughts on Santa Rosa, Sonoma County and California generally. They've all "bet their futures, mostly on cars, trucks, airplanes, highways and runways—and therefore, in effect, on oil," he writes. "It appears to be a losing bet."

Heinberg hopes to see a dismantling of the power of corporations to maximize profits at the expense of society as a whole. "Our civilization is well in decline," he says. "The process will accelerate, though we can slow it by moving away from corporations and toward co-ops that operate locally and that offer high-quality products to consumers."

Despite gloomy thoughts and a host of even gloomier book titles to his name—*The Party's Over, Powerdown* and *The End of Growth*—Heinberg enjoys a good party, a good laugh, a good meal and the good life itself. And he's positively upbeat in a chapter called "All Roads Lead Local." © 2015 Resilience.org

Richard Heinberg is a senior fellow at the Post Carbon Institute and the author of twelve books, including his most recent: Afterburn: Society Beyond Fossil Fuels. Previous books include: Snake Oil: How Fracking's False Promise of Plenty Imperils Our Future; The Party's Over: Oil, War, and the Fate of Industrial Societies; Peak Everything: Waking Up to the Century of Declines; and The End of Growth: Adapting to Our New Economic Reality.

Rising Impacts on Human Health from Climate

The threat from climate change to human health is so great that it could undermine the previous 50 years of gains in development and global health, experts warned recently.

Extreme weather events such as floods and heat waves bring rising risks of infectious diseases, poor nutrition and stress, the specialists said, while polluted cities where people work long hours and have no time or space to walk, cycle or relax are bad for the heart as well as respiratory and mental health.

Almost 200 countries have set a 2 degrees C global average temperature rise above pre-industrial times as a ceiling to limit climate change, but scientists say the current trajectory could lead to around a 4 degrees C rise in average temperatures, risking droughts, floods, storms and rising sea levels.

"That scenario has very serious and potentially catastrophic effects for biosphere health and even imperils human survival," said Anthony Costello, director of University College London's (UCL) Institute for Global Health, who co-led the report.

"We see climate change as a major health issue, and that's often neglected in policy debates," he told reporters at a briefing in London. The report, commissioned and published by The Lancet medical journal, was compiled by a panel of specialists including European and Chinese climate scientists and geographers, social, environmental and energy scientists, biodiversity experts and health professionals. It said that because responses to mitigate climate change have direct and indirect health benefits - from reducing air pollution to improving diet - a concerted effort would also provide a great opportunity to improve global health.

The report said direct health impacts of climate change come from more frequent and intense extreme weather events, while indirect impacts come from changes in infectious disease patterns, air pollution, food insecurity and malnutrition, displacement and conflicts.

Two officers at a Palm Beach juvenile facility are currently facing criminal charges for arranging a fight between two youth for the officers' entertainment. In a separate incident, another teen was recently assaulted so badly that he was hospitalized for injuries including a broken jaw.

Florida's Palm Beach Juvenile Facility currently houses more than 100 minors. Rather than incarcerating so many young people in large, prison-like facilities, our state should invest in the future of our children. The Dept. of Juvenile Justice should place young people in community-based programs and small therapeutic settings which have proven to be more effective in rehabilitation, reducing crime, helping young people turn their lives around, and promoting public safety. Tell DJJ to protect our children and close this troubled facility now!





Is Human creativity Less evident in Atheists, especially scientists?

In addition, the creativity of scientists allows them to discover ways to increase the quality of life (often extending it via medical science) so we can all, including very gifted and talented artists, to be in the position to create and have the opportunity for long, fulfilling lives.

In the last one hundred years there have been many famous non-religious artists: H. G. Wells, Mark Twain, John Lennon, Gene Roddenberry, George Bernard Shaw, Arthur Rubenstein, Kurt Vonnegut, James Joyce, and H.L. Mencken for starters. And we can be sure to look forward to more in the coming decades.

Atheists can be creative and smart just like religious people. There really is no mystery regarding this reality. Richard Feynman was a Nobel physicist, a visual artist, and a musician (not to mention a thrilling, in-demand university professor).

Artistic people are sometimes known to drink alcohol to excess and take drugs. The endorphins which are released may be connected to their creative bursts. Perhaps religious beliefs also act in a drug-like manner, triggering the release of creativity-enhancing endorphins? (Was that mental musing a bit too creative?)


The Humanist Approach to Happiness, and her latest book, The Bully Vaccine.

Can Bankers Change?



What does the continued problem with how our biggest banks are run teach us about change management?

The Atlantic published an excellent article about the banking industry – see: http://www.theatlantic.com/magazine/archive/2015/05/can-bankers-behave/389558/ The question asked is – can bankers behave? The answer is obviously yes, but the structure of certain banks makes that change very very hard.

The article is ultimately a story about ethical habit formation and how change occurs. What I want to discuss here is the part of the article that focuses on the CEO of Morgan Stanley, James Gorman.

While we can debate the merits of the changes made at Morgan Stanley, what isn't debatable is that Gorman was successful at making the changes he wanted to make.

Why was he successful when so many people struggle to create change within their organizations? His attitude was if you don't like the changes – leave. If you want to work at a hedge fund – do it – our core business is that we are a bank. And people did leave. And that was ok.

The mistake that managers wanting to create change make is in thinking – they have to make people change. The reality is that not everyone will change. Not everyone wants to. It's ok if they don't; they just need to find employment elsewhere if the fit is no longer good for them.

Change is hard. People resist it. That is normal. It's a process that takes place over time and you will have early adopters and once the change is proven to work, mass adoption. And, there will be some holdouts that refuse to change. Sometimes you can drag them along kicking and screaming and they will become your biggest advocates. And sometimes, you just need to let them find employment that is better suited to them.

Accepting that you can't be everything to everyone takes courage. It takes courage to stand by your core mission as an organization. This is especially important if your corporate culture has allowed unethical behavior to propagate. Changing the culture to promote ethical behavior means, some people will have to go. Never allow people who want to be unethical to steer you off course and keep you from creating the positive social change you know is right.

FYI - discuss the change management process in detail and how to use behavioral psychology to help this process along, paying specific attention to resistance to change, which in the behavioral model is considered an extinction burst and it's predicted. Understand why and how that resistance will help you manage it when it occurs.

opposes all private school voucher programs because public funds should be spent on public schools, not private schools. It is the view of ISHV that two major goals drive voucher programs. One, is to simply destroy the public school system in the United States, replacing it with corporate owned and religious schools, displacing tax dollars and forcing taxpayers to support the profits of big business and the income of religious schools thereby favoring those religions, a clear violation of democratic principle. The public school system is an important component of the U.S. democracy. The other is a long term tactic to re-segregate the school population.

Open and nondiscriminatory in their acceptance of all students, American public schools are a unifying factor among the diverse range of ethnic and religious communities in our society. Public schools are the only schools that must meet the needs of all students. They do not turn children or families away. They serve children with physical, emotional and mental disabilities, those who are extremely gifted, and those who are learning challenged, right along with children without special needs.

Vouchers undermine this vital function, however, by placing some of the most motivated students into private schools, leaving the students who are most difficult to educate behind in the public schools. Voucher programs fail to offer students better educational resources, greater opportunities for academic achievement, or adequate accountability to taxpayers. For these reasons and more, we urge opposition to all such schemes.



An Incredible Interactive Chart of Biblical Contradictions

A few years ago, computer science whiz **Chris Harrison** created a <u>beautiful visualization</u> linking up *every cross reference in the Bible*. So, for example, if a verse in the New Testament referred back to a verse in the Old Testament, there was an arc drawn between the two chapters they were in (the vertical lines at the bottom represent the number of verses in that chapter):



Amazing! Turns out there are 63,779 cross references in the Bible (and that many arcs in the image)! If it's any indication of how complex this image is, the <u>high-resolution version</u> is more than 100MB large.

In 2009, graphic designer **Andy Marlow** used Harrison's work as his inspiration to created a <u>similar visual</u> for **Sam Harris'** Reason Project. This time, though, he only included arcs representing <u>contradictions</u> in the <u>Bible</u>.

Now, computer programmer **Daniel G. Taylor** has taken all that data and turned it into a visual masterpiece. His website, <u>BibViz</u> (Bible Visualization), gives you the same linking arcs as before, but when you hover over one of them, it lights up and tells you in the upper right-hand corner of the screen which verses are being linked together. Click on an arc and it takes you directly to those verses as compiled in the <u>Skeptics Annotated Bible</u>.

... The whole site is seriously an incredible resource. Go there and just play around with it. Then show your fundamentalist religious friends and watch them squirm. There's just no plausible way anyone can take the Bible literally after spending time on this site... unless they're closing their eyes, sticking their fingers in their ears, and refusing to think about any of the errors in their worldview.

The theist who asks the question What is the meaning of life? and insists that without some divine purpose life would be meaningless is not only masking his own insecurity but also displaying an infantile reaction; he has little faith in his own unaided powers of reason and fragile confidence in his ability to solve the problems of life on his own. Insofar as man is dependent upon God for his very being, his life has no significance in itself. This is all the more true if this life is simply a testing ground or waiting room for the afterlife, a way-station to hell or paradise.

How Creationism Was Created

With so many Christians harboring Creationist beliefs and using the anti-gay refrain "It's Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve," the role of the First Man Ever isn't one we can immediately dismiss. Adam (and what he represents) looms large over the faith.

Karl W. Giberson, a scientist and former evangelical Christian, has now written a book explaining the consequences of belief in Adam. It's called Saving the Original Sinner: How Christians Have Used the Bible's First Man to Oppress, Inspire, and Make Sense of the World (Beacon Press, 2015).

The story of how young-earth creationism, often just called creationism, eclipsed the far more intellectual — and orthodox traditionalism from which it arose is an odd tale. One can be forgiven for thinking — as creationists like to claim — that God was its author. The movement is so popular now that most of America's one hundred million evangelicals embrace it by default, believing it to be the only authentically biblical position available. Creationism came out of left field.

World's Oceans Could Rise Higher, Sooner, Faster

Than Most Thought Possible

If a new scientific paper is proven accurate, the international target of limiting global temperatures to a 2°C rise this century will not be nearly enough to prevent catastrophic melting of ice sheets that would raise sea levels much higher and much faster than previously thought possible.

—Dr. James HansenAccording to the new study—which has not yet been peer-reviewed, but was written by former NASA scientist James Hansen and 16 other prominent climate researchers—current predictions about the catastrophic impacts of global warming, the melting of vast ice sheets, and sea level rise do not take into account the feedback loop implications of what will occur if large sections of Greenland and the Antarctic are consumed by the world's oceans.

A summarized draft of the full report was released to journalists on Monday, with the shocking warning that such glacial melting will "likely" occur this century and could cause as much as a ten foot sea-level rise in as little as fifty years. Such a prediction is much more severe than current estimates contained in reports issued by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC)—the UN-sponsored body that represents the official global consensus of the scientific community.

"If the ocean continues to accumulate heat and increase melting of marine-terminating ice shelves of Antarctica and Greenland, a point will be reached at which it is impossible to avoid large scale ice sheet disintegration with sea level rise of at least several meters," the paper states.

Separately, the researchers conclude that "continued high emissions will make multi-meter sea level rise practically unavoidable and likely to occur this century. Social disruption and economic consequences of such large sea level rise could be devastating. It is not difficult to imagine that conflicts arising from forced migrations and economic collapse might make the planet ungovernable, threatening the fabric of civilization."

The Daily Beast's Mark Hertsgaard, who attended a press call with Dr. Hansen on Monday, reports that the work presented by the researchers is warning that humanity could confront "sea level rise of several meters" before the end of the century unless greenhouse gas emissions are slashed much faster than currently contemplated.

This roughly 10 feet of sea level rise—well beyond previous estimates—would render coastal cities such as New York, London, and Shanghai uninhabitable. "Parts of [our coastal cities] would still be sticking above the water," Hansen said, "but you couldn't live there." This apocalyptic scenario illustrates why the goal of limiting temperature rise to 2 degrees Celsius is not the safe "guardrail" most politicians and media coverage imply it is, argue Hansen and 16 colleagues in a blockbuster study they are publishing this week in the peer-reviewed journal *Atmospheric Physics and Chemistry*. On the contrary, a 2C future would be "highly dangerous."

If Hansen is right—and he has been right, sooner, about the big issues in climate science longer than anyone—the implications are vast and profound. In the call with reporters, Hansen explained that time is of the essence, given the upcoming climate talks in Paris this year and the grave consequences the world faces if bold, collective action is not taken immediately. "We have a global crisis that calls for international cooperation to reduce emissions as rapidly as practical," the paper states. Hansen said he has long believed that many of the existing models were under-estimating the potential impacts of ice sheet melting, and told the *Daily Beast*: "Now we have evidence to make that statement based on much more than suspicion." Though he acknowledged the publication of the paper was unorthodox, Hansen told reporters that the research itself is "substantially more persuasive than anything previously published." In response to the paper, climate scientist Michael Oppenheimer of Princeton University affirmed: "If we cook the planet long enough at about two degrees warming, there is likely to be a staggering amount of sea level rise. Key questions are when would greenhouse-gas emissions lock in this sea level rise and how fast would it happen? The latter point is critical to understanding whether and how we would be able to deal with such a threat."

The new research, Oppenheimer added, "takes a stab at answering the 'how soon?' question but we remain largely in the dark. Giving the state of uncertainty and the high risk, humanity better get its collective foot off the accelerator."

And as the *Daily Beast*'s Hertsgaard notes, Hansen's track record on making climate predictions should command respect from people around the world. The larger question, however, is whether humanity has the capacity to act.

"The climate challenge has long amounted to a race between the imperatives of science and the contingencies of politics," Hertsgaard concludes. "With Hansen's paper, the science has gotten harsher, even as the <u>Nature Climate Change study</u> affirms that humanity can still choose life, if it will. The question now is how the politics will respond—now, at Paris in December, and beyond."

The St. Petersburg Declaration

Released by the delegates to the Secular Islam Summit, St. Petersburg, Florida on March 5, 2007

We are secular Muslims, and secular persons of Muslim societies. We are believers, doubters, and unbelievers, brought together by a great struggle, not between the West and Islam, but between the free and the unfree.

We affirm the inviolable freedom of the individual conscience. We believe in the equality of all human persons.

We find traditions of liberty, rationality, and tolerance in the rich histories of pre-Islamic and Islamic societies. These values do not belong to the West or the East; they are the common moral heritage of humankind.

We see no colonialism, racism, or so-called "Islamophobia" in submitting Islamic practices to criticism or condemnation when they violate human reason or rights.

We call on the governments of the world to

reject Sharia law, fatwa courts, clerical rule, and state-sanctioned religion in all their forms; oppose all penalties for blasphemy and apostasy, in accordance with Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human rights;

eliminate practices, such as female circumcision, honor killing, forced veiling, and forced marriage, that further the oppression of women;

protect sexual and gender minorities from persecution and violence; reform sectarian education that teaches intolerance and bigotry towards non-Muslims;

and foster an open public sphere in which all matters may be discussed without coercion or intimidation.

We demand the release of Islam from its captivity to the totalitarian ambitions of power-hungry men and the rigid strictures of orthodoxy.

We enjoin academics and thinkers everywhere to embark on a fearless examination of the origins and sources of Islam, and to promulgate the ideals of free scientific and spiritual inquiry through cross-cultural translation, publishing, and the mass media.

We say to Muslim believers: there is a noble future for Islam as a personal faith, not a political doctrine;

to Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Hindus, Baha'is, and all members of non-Muslim faith communities: we stand with you as free and equal citizens; and to nonbelievers: we defend your unqualified liberty to question and

dissent.

Before any of us is a member of the Umma, the Body of Christ, or the Chosen People, we are all members of the community of conscience, the people who must choose for themselves.

Dealing with Grief as an Individual

Coping with grief is tough. Secularists may find grief particularly difficult to navigate, considering that there aren't many cultural road maps for processing loss without religion. Experiencing a death within your SSA affiliate group can be especially hard. Here we discuss what grief is, and provide tips on how to deal with grief and create a coping mechanism as a secular

how to deal with grief and create a coping mechanism as individual, as well as provide resources for therapies and counseling.

There is a <u>separate resource here</u> that covers how to help others in your group process grief, and how to run a group discussion on grief. There is also a resource on the <u>death</u>.

Much of this is taken from Dr. William Meek's article in <u>Psychology Today</u>.

Five stages of grief. Is this accurate?

You may have heard of the 5 stages of grief, a concept formed by Elisabeth Kubler-Ross. However, this model refers to the emotional stages of coming to terms with your own death, not the death of someone close to you, which makes it inapplicable in many cases. Instead look to Sidney Zisook and his research on dealing with grief. Zisook posits that there are four components of

grief, and depending on the person and the situation you may experience any or all of them to different degrees. The four components are:

- 1. 1. Separation Distress: feelings associated with sadness, anxiety, pain, anger, loneliness.
- 2. 2. Traumatic Distress: states of disbelief and shock, intrusions, and efforts to avoid intrusions and the spike of emotions they produce.
- 3. 3. Guilt, remorse, and regrets.
- 4. 4. Social withdrawal.

These experiences are not limited to times of loss. Grief may also cause symptoms similar to depression, such as loss of interest in activities, low energy, and overall depressed mood.
